

## GO CHOIRBOYS!

## US soccer expert Marty O. Neil looks back at 2017

After a sweet sixteen streak, Coach Unsworth was real stoked to be taking his Choirboys to sing victory songs at Major League franchise Tottingham Whitehotspurs in the Soccer Association Cup. The fans who made the field trip saw Team President Paul Hayles give the Wonderers a shock two-zero midpoint victory and while the Whitehotspurs struck back, Barry Thompson's head-kick looked to have sealed the shock W. However, Delboy Alley equalled before Sunshine O'Ming broke Choirboy hearts in the extra game death zone.

The Choirboys then failed to reach Wembley soccer stadium when they were defeated at the Final Elimination Phase of the Check-It-Out-Now Shield by the Coventry Sky Sports Blues. Coach Unsworth still hoped to still make post-season, but his team went zero for six, thanks largely to a number of his ball-players being on the disabled list. They finally achieved a W away at Grimsby Fishermen, although an Awesome Friday showdown loss against Mansfield Stags looked to have put paid to a shot at a play-off berth. However, they picked up two more W's and a final day clash at Adams Ballpark against the Cambridge Educators saw hopes raised. Despite Scotty Cash-Get's headkick, other franchises also picked up victory points and the Choirboys would remain in the EFL Divisional Two Section for the next soccer semester.

Frozen yoghurt salesman Randy Howard then opted to sell the franchise to peanut vendor Trevor St. Rowd, who had to inject some dollars to improve the quality in the clubhouse. The first piece of business was the renew of the contract of last season's MVP, Andy 'The Bear' AkinFenway.

The close season draft saw Coach Unsworth cut left-sided attack middle fielders Miles West-Town and Sammy Woody from the roster, along with Hall of Fame vet Barry Thompson. Centralised defensive blocker Andy Pier opted to swap franchises and is now contracted to the North Hamptons in the EFL Divisional First Section.

Drafted in were blocker Andy the Abs, former boxer Mike Tyson, Craig 'Return of the Mack' Smith and returning goalshot-denier Scotty Brown, hoping to beam the Choirboys up a Divisional Section. The Choirboys made CNN and Fox News headlines with the launch of their new goalshot-denier uniform, specially designed by coach Ricardo's son, to help shore up the end zone.

The Choirboys' home season opener against Abraham Lincoln saw a Lucky O'Nien head strike and a Jock Jacobs field goal achieve a tie game. The first field trip of the season was to Park Vale, where the Choirboys scored three quick touchdowns, meaning the two homers from the Valiants in the bottom of the ninth were rendered meaningless. It wasn't until the trip to New York County in Southern Whales that a shut-out was achieved, but Coach Unsworth must be high-fiving about the number of goalstrikes the Wonderers have been winning. Best of these was a late touchdown by Nate Tyson, who's final goal strike against The Crew sealed an awesome walk-off home victory that had the fans busting some cool dance moves in the bleachers. A tie-game with Belinda Carlisle saw opposition goal-attacker Shane Miller use fake news to win a goalzone infringement advantage kick, for which he later received a double post-game dishonesty timeout, after the sports umpire watched a multi-angle super slo-mo playback on the jumbotron big screen.

In the Check-It-Out-Now Shield, The Choirboys were nuked by a score of five to one against by the Bristol Lightning and a further L to the Swindon Robins saw The Choirboys eliminated from the opening qualifying round divisional system, although an exhibition match against Major League franchise West Side Ironhammers will still go ahead. In the Soccer Association Cup, The Choirboys defeated semi-pro little leaguers Sunny Hill Minors, setting up a Second Elimination Stage Deathmatch against tagteam duo Billy Ricky and Leatherface from the Texas Chainsaw Massacre.

Determined to make the Choirboys the most winningest team in the state of Buckhampshire, Coach Unsworth used the latest round of drafts to trade in Scarface from Birmingham Alabama and rapper Easy E from NWA. Rookie middle-spacer Donny Roe and Team President Paul Hayles were both cut, while Harry Michaelman popped his leg in practice. ## **The Good Old Hayes**

With Wycombe captain Paul Hayes calling time on his Wanderers career after three and a half memorable years at the club, we look back on the number nine's 9 greatest moments.

## 1. A debut to remember

Out of favour at Charlton Athletic midway through the 2011-2012 season, Hayes was allowed to join Wycombe on loan, who were battling relegation at the foot of the League One table. Making his Chairboys debut against Hartlepool, the striker had to endure a goal drought of a whole five minutes before getting his first goal in the blue quarters. He went on to grab a brace as Wycombe romped to a 5-0 win. Forming a deadly partnership with Stuart Beavon, Hayes went on to score six times in six appearances for Gary Waddock's side, with Wycombe winning four and drawing one of those games. Sadly, his good form prompted Charlton to recall him from Adams Park, although frustratingly he only made two more appearances for the Addicks as they clinched the League One title. Wycombe's good form tailed off and they were relegated back to League Two.

## 2. Hayes returns!

Two years later and with Wycombe narrowly avoiding relegation out of the Football League at the end of the 2013-2014 season, it was clear that Gareth Ainsworth needed to make some drastic changes both on and off the pitch. More quality and commitment was needed on it and more professionalism and leadership was needed off it. Many Blues fans less than excited for what was threatening to be more of the same in the coming season, but Ainsworth had big plans for Wycombe Wanderers and began restructuring the club by making Hayes his first signing of the summer, appointing him captain in the process. The news gave the Wycombe faithful a huge lift and set the tone for the new, improved Wycombe Wanderers that Ainsworth was creating. Hayes used his experience, influence and leadership skills to help bring about a huge culture change at Adams Park that helped pull the club out of the doldrums and push it up the league, a legacy that will hopefully last for many years to come.

## 3. A stunning start to the season

Any lingering fears Wycombe fans had for the 2014-2015 season were swiftly banished as the Wanderers made a superb start to the campaign, topping the table for much of the first half of the season. A lot of this was down to the goals of the red hot Hayes, who hit 8 in Wycombe's opening 17 league games, including a delightful flick and volley on the turn in a 3-1 win over Stevenage and a thumping strike (and delighted celebration in front of the home fans) in a 2-1 win away at local rival and plucky non leaguers Oxford United.

## 4. THAT penalty

With the season drawing to a close, a tired and injury-hit Wycombe side were battling to hold on to the third and final automatic promotion place in League Two. The games were coming thick and fast and it was a depleted Wanderers side that went out to face Exeter City at Adams Park on a Tuesday night in April. With the game finely balanced at 1-1, an injury to Nico Yennaris resulted in the six minutes of injury time being doubled to twelve and it was at the very end of the last of these, the  $102^{nd}$  minute, that Wycombe were awarded a penalty, for what would be the last kick of the game. Three thousand Wycombe fans fell silent and an eerie hush descended on Adams Park as Paul Hayes, seemingly the only calm person in the ground, placed the ball on the spot in front of the Valley End Terrace and then, after what seemed like an agonisingly long wait, calmly sent Christie Pym the wrong way to spark incredible, riotous scenes among the Chairboys faithful.

## 5. Pummelling Plymouth in the playoffs

With Wycombe finishing in fourth place, just outside the automatic promotion places, the Chairboys would face a strong Plymouth Argyle side in the League Two Playoffs. Hayes had endured a short and unhappy loan spell at Argyle the previous season and had delighted in scoring at Home Park in Wycombe's league win over the Pilgrims earlier in the season. He repeated the trick in the playoffs, opening the scoring with a clever, close range flick on ten minutes, as Wycombe went on to claim a 3-2 victory in the first leg.

In the second leg at Adams Park, Hayes needed even less time to find the back of the net, again scoring the opening goal with another close range finish after just eight minutes. Wycombe saw out a 2-1 win to claim a 5-3 aggregate victory and a place in the final at Wembley. The jubilant home fans streamed onto the pitch, celebrating a memorable win that will live long in the memories of Wanderers supporters.

## 6. Walking out at Wembley

Paul Hayes became the first Wycombe captain to walk out at the new Wembley and the first Chairboys skipper at the national stadium since Glyn Creaser eleven years earlier. Although the game ended in heartbreak as the Chairboys lost on penalties, there was also a huge amount of pride in what Gareth Ainsworth's men had achieved, just twelve months on from their final day Football League survival.

### 7. Fan Power!

The following season got off to bad start for Hayes, failing to score in six appearances before picking up an injury that ruled him out for nearly two months. However, his comeback was accelerated thanks to the Wycombe fans, as the club were able to purchase new specialist medical equipment thanks to money raised through donations from supporters. Hayes returned earlier than expected and started the home game against Carlisle. With the Chairboys 1-0 down in the 90<sup>th</sup> minute, it was Hayes who was able to pay the fans back, chesting down a loose ball on the edge of the area before cleverly lobbing the keeper for a last-gasp equaliser, running to the Wycombe bench to celebrate with the physio who had helped him back to fitness.

## 8. FA Cup adventures

Wycombe hadn't progressed beyond the second round of the FA Cup for five years and after seeing off non-league Halifax in the first round, a second round tie away at League One Millwall didn't look particularly promising. However, Hayes put the Wanderers 1-0 up at The Den with a well-taken goal and Michael Harriman's late strike set up a third round game against Premier League side Aston Villa. Having held the Midlands giants to a 1-1 draw at Adams Park, the FA Cup once again took the Blues to Villa Park, with Hayes following in the footsteps of Keith Ryan as he proudly led Wycombe Wanderers out onto the pitch.

## 9. Spurs

There were more FA Cup adventures the following season. After seeing off Portsmouth in the first round, Wycombe faced a tricky second round tie away at League One side Chesterfield. Up stepped Hayes to put Wycombe 1-0 with a header, as the Chairboys thrashed the Spireites 5-0. A hard-fought win against a spirited Stourbridge side in the third round put Wycombe into the FA Cup Fourth Round for only the second time in their history and the Blues couldn't have been rewarded with a better draw, against Premier League highfliers Tottenham Hotspur at White Hart Lane.

Wycombe started the game well, taking the game to the North London club and Hayes was unlucky not to score after just 45 seconds when his close range header hit the bar. The Wycombe captain was not to be denied however and in the 23<sup>rd</sup> minute he put the Wanderers ahead with a sweetly struck left-footed volley, to the delight of the travelling supporters. After being on hand at the other end of the pitch to clear Sissoko's effort of the line, Hayes then sparked pandemonium amongst the Wycombe fans, when he made it 2-0 with an expertly taken penalty after Wood was brought down by Carter-Vickers.

Although Tottenham went on to win the match 4-3, it was a thrilling encounter and one that can be looked back on with great pride and fondness. Wycombe were the only side to score more than two goals at White Hart Lane that season and Hayes was the only player to score more than once. It was a tremendous game and arguably the finest performance in the blue quarters by Wycombe's heroic captain.



## **Get Involved**

Thanks to the unstinting work and generous donations of countless Chairboys fans, Wycombe Wanderers Football Club continue to progress under supporter ownership. However, there is still much to be done. If you are interested in assisting the club, there are a number of ways you can get involved.

## **500 Club**

Following its success last season, Wycombe Wanderers are re-running the 500 Club, with the aim of raising £75,000 for the playing budget, through 500 donations of £150. All money raised will be exclusively for investment in the squad and last season this helped fund the transfers of Dominic Gape and Sam Saunders. Already over 100 supporters have pledged in excess £16,000 for Gareth Ainsworth to bolster the squad in the January transfer window.

Fans can donate either the full £150 up front, or commit to twelve monthly payments of £12.50p. Members will receive a 500 Club badge, entry into a number of prize draws, second priority after season ticket holders for high-demand away cup games, and an invitation to an exclusive event with the players towards the end of the season.

## **Community Share Scheme**

The Community Share Scheme continues to thrive and produce much needed income for the Football Club. To date, over 180 fans have contributed some £545,000, with a further £190,000 committed over the next two seasons, well over a third of the £2m target the Wycombe Wanderers Trust set out to raise over 5 years.

Much of the initial money raised went into stabilising the club's finances and providing some much needed working capital, ensuring Wycombe Wanderers could remain under fan ownership. Since then, the money raised by the scheme has been invested in a number of important projects, including purchasing medical equipment, buying Michael Harriman from QPR and making essential upgrades and improvements around Adams Park, that the club would otherwise have not been able to afford.

Please do consider investing in the scheme, either by setting up a monthly payment plan or by donating a one-off payment of whatever you can afford. The minimum investment is £100 and the maximum is £100,000. Although Ann will be deeply missed by her family and friends, the family tradition of supporting Wycombe Wanderers continues with Paul, a season ticket for the past 35 years, his partner Jane and their daughter Aimee, both now season ticket holders for more than ten years and all regulars in The Family Stand.

## A View from Afar - Four Weddings

My summer was spent attending weddings. At one, the father of my goddaughter mentioned the mighty Chairboys, as her husband is a Wigan Rugby League eggwrestling fan and drinks "girlie lager". Next up, Row H Junior got married to the leader of the Brittany Blues Supporters Club. I was disappointed to see her bridesmaids in dresses rather than the Wanderers shirts I had seen them all in previously. Junior made a fantastic speech which involved peeling off various football shirts. A France shirt for the bride's family, an Ajax shirt for the Dutch relatives and a Wanderers shirt for the Wycombe family, before finishing with a specially printed shirt of husband and wife. All this took place, not in rural France, but near Solihull Moors' ground, so the FA Cup game was a time for a grand reunion with the Brummie Blues Branch.

A week later my nephew got married near Chorley, with the reception 56 miles away, where the highlight was the first dance; my nephew desperately counting the steps to 'A Moment Like This' by Leona Lewis. It's the happy couple's special tune and it's special to me too, for a different reason. December 2006 and Leona wins *The X Factor*. January 2007. Wycombe v Chelsea and the 1-1 draw. Even now I have to hold my breath as Jermaine Easter's shot rolls so, so slowly into the back of the net. At the end of the match, as everyone filed out, the tannoy played 'A Moment Like This' and I stood there, just savouring the moment. I can still feel that emotion in my stomach when I hear the song. I wrote about it at the time in this fanzine.

Many teams never make a semi-final, for Wycombe to have reached two in recent times is amazing, particularly have risen from non-league. It was a dream. It was also a moment to wonder the next time the ground would be full and if such dizzy heights could be reached again. Last season we got Spurs. I guess the optimism makes it all worth while. This is a great club, with a great manager and staff and fans. Please remember we are 'punching above our weight'. With limited resources, the club is surviving where it should be struggling. Be disappointed when we lose, be happy when we win. Play 'what-if?' and don't be hard on the manager and players. Better teams than Wycombe have dropped through the trapdoor into the National League.

Finally, we had a weekend nostalgia trip to Margate. The quicker they progress to League Two for the ultimate away game the better; Dreamland Theme Park, Antique Quarter, sand and beer. We finished at Hythe for a train ride after visiting the parish church where we sang an old hymn:

"I cannot tell why he, whom angels worship, Should set his love upon the sons of men, Or why, as Shepherd, he should seek the *wanderers*"

## Sing Wehn you're winning

In March 2002, a young German pitched up in High Wycombe after leaving his homeland to take a job in the marketing department of Wycombe Wanderers. God only knows what happened to him at Adams Park, but fifteen years later Henning Wehn is now one of the biggest names in British stand-up comedy.

We managed to catch up with the German Comedy Ambassador to the UK during his successful run at the Edinburgh Fringe with his new show 'Westphalia Is Not An Option'. As the Scottish weather sent tourists and street performers scurrying for shelter, we settled ourselves down in a quiet corner of a noisy café for cups of tea, an unfeasibly large plate of scrambled eggs and a chat about all things Wycombe...

## How did your association with Wycombe Wanderers first come about?

The company I was working for back home in Westphalia was about to go under. I thought my CV looked alright, but I didn't speak English, so I applied for jobs in and around London. I've always worked in sport, so I applied to the 92 league clubs in England, managed to arrange a few interviews and then was very lucky timing-wise that I applied just when Simon Monkman started as the Chief Executive. I could essentially only offer a research project. I couldn't sell anything; my English was nowhere near good enough. But I knew I could work out how the club was seen by all the different stakeholders and where they wanted the club to go, be that staff or local businesses or sponsors. So I offered that and at the time Wycombe didn't really have anything like that, they didn't know much about their customers – I'm sorry for saying customers – but Simon said 'That's exactly what we need, let's give that a go' and then shortly after Simon went then I was gone as well, because he only lasted about four months or so.

## Were Wycombe your first choice, or were you working your way through the Football League alphabetically?

I think Wycombe was my choice number 88 when I sent out the application, because I sent it out in alphabetical order obviously, but all on the same day. Then I had that first meeting with Simon and was like 'This is good. This is a fun club'. I had interviews with West Ham, Arsenal and Spurs, but essentially all they were offering was, at best, something like intern. I could see me...I don't know... just tearing off the tickets on matchday or something. Simon offered something that I could actually do, so I thought 'Well let's go for that.'

## What happened when you rang up Port Vale about sending in your CV?

I rang all the clubs to work out who to address it to, who's the head of HR and some geezer at Port Vale picks up the phone and goes 'Send it to Barry Bigtits'. Now, in all likelihood that isn't the geezer's name, but if it is his name he'll get very few application and you stand a decent chance, so I did send an application to Barry Bigtits at Port Vale.

## But you never heard back?

Sadly not.

Maybe he's just really disorganised?

He's a tit.

## What were your first impressions of High Wycombe? Did you do the Chair Museum on day one, or did you build up to it?

I'm still saving that one for a big day. Very positive first impressions of High Wycombe. Keith Allen immediately put me up with Cyril Rance. Cyril was in his eighties and it was like a rite of passage that if you came from out of town and joined Wycombe Wanderers, you would be staying in Cyril's guest room. Keith had done that when he came down from the midlands and so had a few other people. So I ended up staying in some semi-detached with some elderly gentleman in Totteridge with a cat and a sticker on the fridge saying 'Mustn't grumble'. In the evening there was always meat and two veg. It was an absolutely brilliant crash course for life in the UK in a bygone era.

### Can you remember your first Wycombe game?

Away to Swindon, I think Wycombe lost 3-0. That was the tail end of the 01/02 season. I remember we were going there by coach and I rocked up there with three cans of lager - thinking that's roughly how many you need to go to Swindon — and then I was told you can't have any alcohol on the coach. What? Was this an Alcoholics Anonymous coach or something? I just couldn't comprehend it. You sit on the coach, going to the football and you're not allowed to drink beer? What's the whole point of going to an away game? That was my first thought. So then you really have to cram in as many as you can once you get to the ground and then after that you're sober and you drive home, it just seemed so ridiculous. Now I'm used to it, but at the time, I mean, that's a very hard sell to anyone; sit on a coach being driven to some industrial estate, go into some plastic-looking ground, endure something far too loud coming over the tannoy, then some average at best football, then get back on the coach and be driven back to some other industrial estate in High Wycombe. 'Oh, that's my day out.'

## Do you have a favourite/funniest memory from your time at the club?

There was a fellow, I forget his name, he was in his eighties and was one of the door to door salesmen for the club lottery and he was always wearing a jumper with the Royal Air Force logo on. He said to me; 'Where in Germany are you from?' I said 'I'm from Hagen' and he said 'Oh I know Hagen, but only from the air.' To make amends he brought me in a tape of British marching songs. It wasn't ill-intended or anything, that was his way of making up.

## Did you like it?

It was lovely. Very well executed.

## How did you make the obvious leap from marketing to comedy?

I left the club and I was working for a sports business magazine called 'Soccer Investor' I was living in London and one night I happened to see a stand up night and thought 'That's enjoyable. I want to give that a go.' I just tried it, had it as a hobby, then I developed it and it became a paid hobby and then at some point I was at a crossroads: did I want to have a well-paid hobby or a shitty-paid job? I said 'Let's go for the job' and then carried on building it up. So essentially all it was was seeing that one night of comedy and saying 'I like the concept of this – stand on stage and say a few things. I wouldn't mind giving that a go.'

### What's the best Wycombe game you've ever been to?

There's so many to choose from isn't there? Seeing them wining away to Charlton in the League Cup - that was quite impressive. Equally, not being outclassed at the Bridge playing away to Chelsea. I would probably say the Spurs game except I wasn't there.

## Who are your favourite Wycombe players, past and present?

Probably the best player I've ever seen for Wycombe would be Roger Johnson. How his career ended without ever playing for England I'll never know. When you saw him at Wycombe, I mean obviously Wycombe isn't top flight, but he looked so much better than anybody else. And you have to give it to Matt Bloomfield. He's still there doing a shift, year in year out. It's phenomenal, being at that level and so loyal to a club is phenomenal. He's already looking to the future; writing his column for the BBC and setting up his football academy. He's really got his head screwed on.

Last season you took over the club's twitter feed to do live updates for our friendly with QPR. Would you ever want to have a go at joining the radio commentary team for a game? You and Bill Turnbull would be an interesting double act.

Well first of all I have to ask Matt Cecil why I wasn't asked back, that's the first thing that wants finding out. I don't know how much I could possibly bring to the party, but it's seats on the halfway line isn't it, so that's a win right there. The people might not get much out of it, but I've got a perfect view of the game.

### Has your Wycombe connection ever caused you trouble on stage in certain towns?

No, not even in Colchester. It's an inoffensive club Wycombe, unless you go to Maidenhead or Chesham, they'd probably tell you otherwise – 'Why do you always win the Berks and Bucks Senior Cup? Give us a chance.' Beaconsfield probably think they're bigger than they are. I remember seeing a friendly away to Henley. It was funny because suddenly Wycombe were the big club from the big town with all ten away supporters. Rena and her gang. It is Rena isn't it, the lady that organises the busses?

## Yes, for the Officials.

Are you unofficial?

We're the Independents. They have to keep us apart at games or we start throwing our packed lunches at each other.

Is there a bit of rivalry between the different clubs?

Not really. We just keep it simmering gently.

A bit like the Judean People's Front in Monty Python.

Kinda. Have you been able to make Wycombe as popular back in Germany as Franz Beckenbauer did the New York Cosmos in the 1970's?

It's a slow burner. That will all change with Champions League football. Imagine Wycombe in the Champions League and the Barcelona team coach stuck for four hours trying to get out of the car park.

Your compatriot Max Müller is settling in after a tough first season. What advice would you give to a young German trying to make it big in the bright lights of High Wycombe?

He was injured a lot wasn't he? I'm really not in a position to give anyone any advice, but just enjoy your time. Whatever happens, if he comes back home to Germany and speaks fluent English, he'll have the experience of having lived somewhere else. Just living abroad, having that experience, especially for a young man like him, is brilliant.

And he'll be able to say he's seen the Chair Museum.

Yeah...

How do you think Wycombe will do this season? Do you think we can go up?

Well hopefully at least chasing for the playoffs. They haven't lost many players have they? The only player they've really lost is Pierre.

What would you rather, Wycombe finish eighth, but Donald Trump gets impeached, or Wycombe get promoted but Trump gets a second term?

Depends very much on what would happen the season after. If we came straight back down with twenty points, then I'm not too bothered about promotion. It's a good question, because you obviously want the team to do well, you want the team to win. But if Wycombe were winning everything for the next three seasons, then they would be in the Premier League. That would change the character of the club and everything you like about the club beyond recognition. You would end up with something that just isn't what attracted you to the club in the first place.

## Like Man City?

Perfect example, who gives a shit about them now? I was there last season and it was quieter than Arsenal. I mean, if all you're interested in is great football, they've got Agüero, De Bruyne...it's brilliant to watch their football. If you go there just to watch exceptionally good football then yeah, you want your team to be like that. But if there's anything else that attracts you to football, like all of you going down to The Hourglass and if you want to play Saturday at three o'clock rather than Sunday at twelve forty-five, are you sure you want to play up there? I want Ainsworth to win the Premier League, but not with Wycombe. You end up with foreign players, foreign owners, foreign supporters, the team off to bloody Asia pre season for no good reason whatsoever and then all of a sudden you've got a global brand in your town that's got absolutely no connection to the town anymore. And that's another beautiful thing about Wycombe, isn't it brilliant that the Trust runs the club? I think the only one who would benefit from Wycombe going up into the Premier League would be Ivor Beeks, because he could charge more for his training facilities. He'd bloody love it.

## It's Battle of the Wycombe Celebrity Fans. It's you, Bill Turnbull and Colin Baker in the ring. Only one of you is coming out alive. Who wins?

Colin Baker? Isn't he Doctor Who?

Yeah. Well, he was, but not anymore.

Well he can travel back and forth. He'll come out alive.

## I don't know if he can still do that now though. I think when you finish you have to hand it all over to the next one.

No, I think it's like a footballer. Once you have the touch it will always stay with you. You might not be able to execute it as quickly, or quite as precisely, but you still know much better what you're doing than someone who has never been at that level.

## Baker wins by time travel. What's the weirdest dream you ever remember having?

Oh the other day I had a weird one. I was dreaming that, for whatever bizarre reason, Bayern Munich signed me as their reserve goalie - I mean I don't know how the \*\*\*\* that comes about — and it's just before the game against Shalke and they just say 'Well, we haven't got anyone' so then I go in there and I haven't even got a PE kit and they say 'No, we've got all the stuff for you'. And then the team went off training and didn't ask me to join them and I'm standing there thinking 'Is that because they think I'm so rubbish I can't be helped anyway, or because I'm so good I don't need to practice? Anyway, they all buggered off and then when the game starts I sit on the bench and I'm just crossing my fingers that nothing happens to Neuer, because the last thing I fancied was standing in goal while everyone kicks the ball at me as hard as they can. Yeah, that was quite a weird dream. And it was during the close season.

### They probably signed you just to sell shirts.

That must have been it. Or some tax dodge, I don't know.

## Have you ever found a cartoon character attractive?

No, I can genuinely say...(thinks)...I can genuinely say I have...I mean I want to be mates with a few. With Asterix and Obelix. I want to be mates with them.

## You could pretty much do whatever you wanted with that kind of muscle behind you.

Yeah. Then the Daltons are good. I'm not sure how popular that is in the UK. That might only be big in Germany. They're four brothers and they're in and out of prison and they go down height-wise from tall to someone really tiny and the really tiny one's the proper aggressive one. I wouldn't mind hanging out with them, they seem good fun.

## What's your spirit animal?

I don't know. What's yours?

Not sure. I'd probably go for a monkey, except I'm scared of heights, so I'd have to be a monkey with no arms or legs because I wouldn't want to do any climbing. I probably wouldn't last long in the jungle.

Which animal loves his peace and quiet? I'd probably be one of those reptiles that lie on hot stones.

### An iguana?

Yeah, I mean, I'm not as nimble, but the soaking up sun bit I could do.

## Oh, maybe a monitor lizard then?

Yeah?

### I think maybe they're a bit bigger and not as quick.

Oh yeah, that's me then. A monitor lizard. They have a pleasant life.

### What's next for you and where can Wycombe fans catch you in the coming months?

The easiest thing to do is probably to go on my website, that's where the upcoming dates are. They can go to the website or see me at Adams Park probably.

### Do you get to many games these days?

It's iffy because I work most Saturdays and there's only so many gigs you can do at the Wycombe Swan. If they were playing more games on Monday mornings I would be there a lot more. That's something they could probably introduce. That's when it would be good to have Wycombe in the Premier League, if that meant they were playing more games on Monday morning at ten o'clock so that they could be broadcast in China or something.

## Sleeping with the Enemy

It might seem innocuous enough, but I was very disappointed to see that Wycombe had played a training ground friendly against MK Dons back in September. This is not because I see the Franchise as any kind of rival, but because their very existence is an affront to the morals and values of football and as such, consorting with them should be avoided wherever possible. Playing the Franchise in any situation is unpalatable, but of course, just like AFC Wimbledon are now experiencing in League One, official league or cup matches have to be played and are unavoidable. But to actively arrange a friendly against them, regardless of whatever benefits to our players, strikes me as a serious error of judgement from those at the club responsible. I am generally very supportive of the club, but this was a poor decision.



It's a little known fact that a home pre-season friendly against them was proposed and even provisionally arranged a couple of years ago, but this idea was thankfully soon scrapped after consultation with Supporters Direct and members of the Wycombe Wanderers Trust, who made their feelings on the matter quite clear. Really, the club probably could have worked that one out for themselves, without having to ask anyone else, but at least it's nice to see that, on that occasion at least, Wycombe fans were consulted on the matter. However, it's sad to see that the feelings expressed back then were apparently not taken on board by the club, as they have quickly revisited the idea, albeit in a behind closed doors training match, rather than a proper pre-season game. I appreciate that these kind of mid-season matches need to be played and finding suitable, local opposition, possibly at short notice cannot be easy, but with the likes of Reading, Watford, Chelsea, Fulham, Brentford and QPR all within a short distance of High Wycombe and considering the links we have with many of these clubs, was it really out of the question to find someone else? Were none of these teams able to find a reserve or development team to accommodate us?

It's been nearly 15 years since MK Dons first mutated into existence. The passing of time is a great ally to those who sin and some of the football fans who were outraged in 2004 will perhaps not be so angry now. People forgive, people forget. There is also now a whole generation of young football fans in this country who will not remember, or were not alive to witness the anguish and destruction that Pete Winkleman, Charles Koppel and the creation of MK Dons caused. For them, the presence of MK Dons in the Football League is as normal as that of Notts County or Sheffield Wednesday. It's up to those who remember and those who are still angry and disgusted to show and tell the footballing world what MK Dons are; a businessman's plaything, built on theft, destruction, greed and the abandonment of our game's proud sporting values.

As a supporter-owned, Trust-run club, I feel we have a duty not to collaborate or otherwise involve ourselves with the likes of MK Dons, as their creation and continued existence goes against a great deal of what this club and its supporters have stood and fought for. We should take a stand and furthermore be seen to do so. Treating MK Dons like a normal, proper football club gives them legitimacy and suggests that we accept them and don't care about the manner in which they were formed.

Let's not forget, it could have been us.

Back in November 1999, after a home FA Cup Second Round game against Wigan Athletic (then a fellow Second Division side) had attracted a gate of 'just' 2,992, then-Wycombe manager Lawrie Sanchez upset a great number of Blues fans when he was quoted in the Bucks Free Press as saying ""This is not a football town. It would be busier if we had a supermarket here. I've given up on the crowd... If they don't want a professional football team there's a few towns that do". Then-Chairman and now Club President Ivor Beeks then joined in, adding "If they don't want football here then perhaps we might have to think about something like that".

The following week, Dave Peters wrote in the Midweek; "Yesterday (Monday) worried directors held a board meeting to discuss revolutionary ways of pumping money into the Club including a possible relocation to Milton Keynes, and changing the entire fabric of the club by courting a sugar daddy backer." An official Press Release from the Club also stated that Beeks had refused to rule out such a move away from Wycombe, stating he had "Refused to rule out a move to Milton Keynes, following disappointing FA Cup attendances at Adams Park." A few days later, Beeks backtracked, telling the BFP; "It was a flippant throw-away remark which was seized upon. Wycombe will always be in Wycombe". The whole thing went down very poorly with supporters, especially as the Board of Directors at the time were attempting to change the constitution of the club, or even scrap it completely, and bring in a big money backer.

Ironically, the National Federation of Football Supporters Clubs (who later merged with the Football Supporters Association to form what is now the Football Supporters Federation) were holding a meeting at Adams Park the following month. The NFFSC were reportedly appalled at the idea of Wycombe relocating to North Bucks, with the Chairman Ian Todd telling the Chairboys on the Net website; "Where permanent club moves have been suggested in the past, [the] Federation has extracted from the Football League an assurance that any new ground would be expected to be located within the conurbation it serves and from which the club draws the vast majority of its support. We could not accept that Milton Keynes fell within these criteria and would actively oppose any such application from Wycombe Wanderers to the League."

It could have been us. We could have been destroyed and turned into MK Wanderers. Thankfully that never came to pass, although this will be of little comfort to fans of the original Wimbledon FC, who suffered instead. Even so, we have almost certainly suffered from the existence of MK Dons, as they aggressively (and quite disrespectfully) target areas of South Bucks with advertising campaigns in an attempt to recruit supporters who might otherwise come to Adams Park on a Saturday.

Funnily enough, a few years later in 2002, when the relocation of Wimbledon FC to Milton Keynes was in the pipeline, Ivor Beeks claimed he was against the move, telling the BFP "I think it's wrong and it worries me. Perhaps they are a one off, but I don't like to see clubs looking to start up again outside their area."

He was named Club President in April 2017.

So what about the friendly? Well, the game has been played and there is nothing that can be done to change that, but as a Trust member I would like to see some assurances, perhaps a charter signed by the Trust and the Club President, that something like this will never happen again and from hereon we will only ever agree to play MK Dons in official scheduled matches.

We must show MK Dons, who are still chaired by Winkleman, who masterminded and orchestrated the whole sordid affair, that we do not accept them and never will. We must show other clubs and their fans who oppose franchise football that we stand with them. We must show the FA that we are still angry at their appalling decision to allow this to happen and that it must never be allowed again, because as we all know all too well, football is awash with unscrupulous men with money, who would happily create a franchised football club of their own if they think there is an appetite for it.

And if they think they will be allowed to get away with it.

<u>The first spell</u> A true club legend, Scotty was a key figure in the club's rise up into the Football League. He even had a club video (it's what we had before DVD's kids – and DVDs are what we had before the interweb thing) named after him. 'Beam us up Scotty' indeed!

<u>He left because</u> He was too good. Even for Wycombe. A £375,000 move to then Premiership side Swindon Town saw him scoring at Anfield. Spells at Stoke, Bournemouth, Norwich and Watford followed.

<u>The second spell</u> He returned in 1997 when John Gregory signed him from Watford. He told Gregory he would add a few hundred to the gate and that most of them would be women. Whether that's true or not (it's not) is beside the point, as he continued to score on a regular basis.

<u>A worthy return?</u> Absolutely. Scotty was a key figure in helping Wycombe avoid relegation in 1997 and scored 13 goals the following season. However, he was approaching the end of his career and played his last Wycombe game at Reading in 1999. Lawrie Sanchez then managed to perform a remarkable piece of business, selling Scotty to Reading for a whopping £250,000. Talk about a good return. He scored just 8 goals in 2 years at Reading before signing for Colchester. We'll forgive him for that.

Just.

## **STEVE GUPPY**

<u>The first spell</u> The left winger was one of the most exciting players to watch in the O'Neill side that won every single game, ever (sort of). His final game was the 1993-1994 Division Three Playoff Final.

<u>He left because</u> Newcastle said they wanted him. They even paid Wycombe £150,000 for him. They then opted not to play him, like, ever (except for one substitute cup appearance) and he joined Port Vale.

<u>The second spell</u> John Gorman got the lad back in November 2004 and he played until February 2005, scoring with a free-kick cross at Swansea in January. We think this stretch of almost eleven years between goals was a record until Nathan Tyson headed in against Col U earlier this year, marking a near twelve-year barren stretch.

<u>A worthy return?</u> Guppy was useful in his brief spell back and aside from the goal at Swansea provided a memorable assist for Keith Ryan's 50<sup>th</sup> Wycombe goal, a 90<sup>th</sup> minute winner against Lincoln, in December 2004. So basically, yeah, he did alright.

## **LUKE OLIVER**

<u>The first spell</u> A gangly 6'7" centre back called up from the youth team in 2002 by Lawrie Sanchez. He made four fairly unspectacular appearances in two fairly unspectacular years and was released in 2004.

He left because He wasn't that good and was released.

<u>The second spell</u> Peter Taylor worked with him at Stevenage and signed him up again in 2009. When Taylor left, so did Oliver and he joined up with him again at Bradford.

<u>A worthy return?</u> Not particularly. Oliver never really impressed at Adams Park. Yet while it's easy to mock, because he quite often looked pretty ridiculous, he still went on to play over 100 times for Bradford City. Arguably a good league two centre back, his time at Wycombe was largely in Division Two/League One and he may have just been out of his depth when at Adams Park.

## **JON-PAUL PITTMAN**

The first spell 'A real whippet' is how Taylor described Pittman prior to signing him from Crawley Town. He wasn't wrong, as JP scored some important goals in the build up to promotion from League Two in 2009, playing with a smile on his face a dance in his feet. The following season he scored some equally big goals; who can forget his wonder-strike against Bristol Rovers, the late goal against Col U in Waddock's first game, or the equaliser away at Leeds, plus strikes against Charlton and Norwich? The debate raged over him being a mere 'impact player', not helped when, in a pre-season game against a Chelsea Youth ninth reserve team, he came off the bench to score a quick-fire hat-trick. The season that followed saw him struggle with injury and score only four goals.

<u>He left because</u> He was released. Many fans felt he still had something to offer, especially when he signed for Oxford in League Two and we loaned in Elliot Benyon from Swindon who were in...League Two.

<u>The second spell</u> Ainsworth picked him up ahead of the 2013-14 season. He came off the bench against Oxford when we were 2-1 up but down to ten men and seemingly couldn't be bothered. He failed to score and was released after the great escape at Torquay, before signing for Grimsby and missing the decisive penalty in the 2015 Conference Playoff Final.

<u>A worthy return?</u> No. He put in a decent shift away at Bristol Rovers in a 1-0 win, but apart from that he hardly featured.

## **ANTHONY STEWART**

<u>The first spell</u> Another centre back who came up through the youth team, he really impressed during his first spell, with a string of fine displays.

<u>He left because</u> He got some bad advice? Maybe? We can but speculate, but he wound up at Crewe where he made just a handful of appearances.

<u>The second spell</u> Ainsworth let bygones be bygones and signed him up again to replace the departing Alfie Mawson in the summer of 2015.

<u>A worthy return?</u> So far, so good. He's probably the best defender we have at the club right now and seems to have his head right. If he sticks around he could end up being a club legend.

## **KEVIN BETSY**

<u>The first spell</u> Signed on a free from Oldham by John Gorman in 2005, the versatile winger/forward quickly became a fans favourite at Adams Park, with his scintillating pace, exciting attacking play and goalscoring ability, helping Wycombe reach the League Cup Semi-finals in 2007.

<u>He left because</u> Bristol City coughed up £150,000 for him, which was probably fair enough.

The second spell Rejoined the club from Southend United after a successful loan spell, but couldn't help Wycombe avoid relegation from League One at the end of the 2009-2010 season. However, he was back to his best the following season as he helped Gary Waddock's side achieve an immediate return to the third tier, as well as gaining international caps for the Seychelles. However, he found his first team opportunities limited the following season and sadly departed my mutual consent in December 2012 as Wycombe sank back into the basement division. He retired in 2015 after a successful spell at Woking.

<u>A worthy return?</u> Yes. Betsy had the magic to light up Adams Park and only Waddock knows why he let such a good player leave at a time when we were fighting for our lives at the foot of the League One table.

## **NATHAN TYSON**

<u>The first spell</u> Signed initially on loan by Tony Adams, Tyson joined permanently from Reading and scored a lot of very good goals. A lot.

<u>He left because</u> He was perhaps one of the best players we've ever had, and Nottingham Forest came in for him, paying £675,000 for his services.

<u>The second spell</u> A decent career at Forest, he played for a few other clubs, only really rediscovering his scoring form at Doncaster Rovers. Ainsworth picked him up in the summer, following a successful trial.

<u>A worthy return?</u> Some were excited, some felt he could well be past it. He has looked pretty useful thus far, with his late winner against Crewe a wonderful throwback to his first spell. Signs are good that once he returns from injury he could prove to be a deadly striker once more.

## The myth...

The story goes that we always play badly and lose the day after Christmas. Full of turkey and mince pies, the team are laborious and get out-played, usually resulting in defeat.

### The case for...

Prior to joining the Football League, our record on 26<sup>th</sup> December was pretty standard – **P43, W21, D8 L15**. It's after we joined the professional ranks that this theory starts. Our first four games in the Football League resulted in three 0-0 draws and a 2-0 defeat, before we finally got our first League Boxing Day goal in a 2-2 draw at Walsall in 1998. A year later we beat Bournemouth 2-1, but the next six post-Christmas outings resulted in five defeats and a draw. It's not hard to see why fans felt we were cursed at this point, with a record that stood at **P12 W1 D5 L6**.

## The case against...

On 26<sup>th</sup> December 2007, a superb second half performance at Griffin Park saw us beat ten man Brentford 3-1. This appears to have lifted the curse and the Boxing Day record since 2007 reads **P10 W4 D3 L3**.


